229,594 The different reasons for removal include transfers out of parish, mental interdictions and challenge procedure (i.e., voter not residing where they claim homestead exemption, etc.)

 The sources used are returned election notices, returned jury summons, Postal Service NCOA information and also address changes made by local governing authorities, including 911 changes.
- 39. What process is used to perform list maintenance? (e.g., is the process electronic or manual)

The annual canvass is both a manual and electronic process. The statewide list of registered voters is sent by electronic file to the NCOA and using that data and other criteria, voters are sent a notice through the postal system. If the notice is returned, the registrars of voters must manually mark the voters' records to send out another notice. In addition the Registrar of Voters are continually performing list maintenance whenever they process death notices, felony convictions.

Based upon reports received, notice is sent advising they have 21 days to appear in the registrar of voters' office to show why their record should not be suspended. If voter fails to appear and show cause, a notice of suspension is sent. The voter is not eligible to

(b) Serving a sentence of incarceration for conviction of a felony

The voter is under suspension and is not eligible to vote.

(c) Serving a term of probation following being convicted of a felony

The voter is under suspension and is not eligible to vote. Upon completion of his probation, the voter's registration may be reinstated upon the voter providing appropriate documentation to the registrar of voters.



If the voter registration application has no response in regard to age, the registrar of voter uses the answer to the question on date of birth to figure the applicant's age for eligibility purposes. There are no numbers available if such instances occurred.

Both the Dept. of State and the Dept. of Public Safety & Corrections is in the process of updating their respective computer systems. At the current time, there is no direct link between departments. Verification of drivers license and social security numbers on mail applications was accomplished prior to the Nov. 04' election using data provided from Dept. of Public Safety & Corrections to the Dept. of State on CD.
