Voter registration agencies mail or transmit via inter-office mail all applications to the Division of Elections. The Division of Elections then sorts the applications based on the registrant's residence and mails the applications to the appropriate municipality.

Written training materials have been provided to all voter registration agencies, with periodic updates provided as changes dictate. The Secretary of State Division of Elections has provided annual training to BMV staff during the last two years.

Applications must be submitted with an original signature. An application that also serves as an absentee ballot application can be faxed, but must also be mailed.
