Department of Motor Vehicles transmits their electronic voter records every week to each county board of elections. At the same time, the hard copies of the registrations are sent by postal service to the individual counties. Other agency registration forms are sent by postal service or courier.

- 21. What, if any, training is provided to employees of voter registration agencies on the voter registration process?
 - A team from SBE meets with agency representatives at least twice each year. SBE team members are available by telephone and for presentations during voter registration agency conferences. An Agency Voter Registration Manual is available online for quick review or for printing. Additionally, we provide training for DMV employees in agency registration.

	When a county board of elections receives a notice of conviction of a felony for a person registered in their county, the board, after having given 30 days written notice, and if the voter makes no objection, shall remove the voter from its voter registration records. If the voter
	(b) Serving a sentence of incarceration for conviction of a felony
	The individual would have been removed as a result of the final judgement.
	(c) Serving a term of probation following being convicted of a felony
	Probation is part of the sentence for the conviction. Until probation and all restitution is satisfied, the felon may not make application for voter registration.

Through SEIMS, the statewide database, we send a nonforwardable first verification notice to new registrants. If that is not returned by the post office in 15 days, the voter is verified. If the first verification is returned a second verification is sent. If that is returned by the post office, the voter is denied. In the case of a change of information for a registered voter, if all notices are returned, the voter is made "inactive". We have detailed procedures for ongoing list maintenance. We can also check against driver's license numbers in real time.
