Paper weight: State law requires the secretary of state to prescribe the voter registration application. Federal law requires the States to provide a voter registration form that is a self-mailer. The form prescribed by the Ohio Secretary of State complies with the federal self-mailer mandate and, consequently, with the U.S. Postal Services' mandatory regulations regarding self-mailers. Fax: Members of the U.S. Armed Forces may fax an FPCA to election officials to register to vote. Electronically transmitted applications are not acceptable. Third parties must deliver in person voter registration applications entrusted to them.

	(b) Serving a sentence of incarceration for conviction of a felony
	Pursuant to Section 2961.01 of the Revised Code of Ohio, a convicted felon is disfranchised while incarcerated on a felony conviction.
	(c) Serving a term of probation following being convicted of a felony
	A felon on probation or parole (or after receiving a final discharge) may register to vote and vote, unless the conviction constituted a second conviction for violating the election laws, in which case the person is permanently disfranchised.
