If serving a sentence in a federal correctional institution they can neither register to vote nor cast a ballot. Once an individual is no (c) Serving a term of probation following being convicted of a felony
	Once an individual is no longer in the custody of the Department of Corrections or imprisoned in any federal correctional institution they can cast a ballot. Custody does not include probation or parole. ORS 137.281
