Voter registration applications are transferred from DOL both electronically and paper to the Office of the Secretary of State. The OSOS sorts and sends to individual counties on both disk and paper by mail. All other agencies transfer applications by mail.

The Office of the Secretary of State does training for the 39 counties' election offices. The OSOS is in the process of developing training for other state agencies, other than written instructions.

Washington State does not accept electronic registrations, except when authorized by law to participate in special projects. Registrations may be accepted by fax, when the original is received within 7 days following transmission. Third party delivery of registrations is accepted
